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Partner Spotlight

Only 26% of Native American communities are within one mile of a grocery store compared to 59% of all people in the United States. In isolated tribal communities, families travel far to shop for essentials, often going off the reservation where there is more variety and prices are lower. The Navajo Relief Fund (NRF), a program of Partnership With Native Americans® (PWNA), aims to alleviate this challenge by delivering emergency food boxes to our Program Partners in underserved tribal communities.

Members of PWNA's Board of Directors and Executive Leadership teamed up with the staff at the Pisinemo Senior Center to pack and deliver boxes to Elders across the Pisinemo District of the Tohono O'odham Nation.

This delivery came at a time of celebration in the community as Elders, children, and families prepared for the upcoming Pisinemo District Day, an annual day of celebration across the district filled with games, music, and dancing. Our Program Partner, Mike B., recruited his employees—Diane, Lystan, and Alvin—to lead the PWNA team in packing and delivering the boxes.

Peach Corn Salsa

INGREDIENTS

- · 4 peaches, diced
- 4 fresh ears of corn, cooked and cut off the cob
- 1 small can diced green chiles*
- ¼ cup fresh cilantro, chopped
- ½ medium sweet or red onion, diced
- 1 small lime, juiced
- 2 dashes hot sauce

*If you like your salsa spicy, use jalapenos instead.

Indigenous Recipe

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Wash and dry peaches. Depending on preference... the skins can remain on or be peeled. (Leaving the skin on provides some good texture). Chop the peaches and place in bowl.
- 2. You can either grill the corn in the husk or you can boil the corn. Once cooked, trim the corn from the cob and mix corn with chopped peaches. (Frozen or canned corn will also work).
- 3.) Mix in the chopped cilantro, chopped onion, lime juice, hot sauce, and season with salt and pepper to taste.

We wrapped up the Feeding America Natives Prepared project with the Hualapai Tribe by conducting a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training on March 20-21, 2025 in Peach Springs, AZ. 12 Tribal members received certification to assist their families, neighbors, and communities during emergencies by training the individuals with the essential skills to respond, including first aid, light search and rescue, fire safety, and team organization. Everyone was able to receive their own CERT starter kit bag, along with a first aid kit, and a fire extinguisher.

All the participants were eager to help their elders and community and noted that they didn't want this CERT team to die down. They want to become a certified CERT team, and additional FEMA training is needed. The group stated they want to learn and stay committed and are happy to answer and serve where needed.

Tribal Emergency Operations Manager Cheyenne Majenty was in attendance and provided her emergency response experiences to provide background on the emergencies in the area. Overall, she was glad to have this training and the interest from the number of participants who showed up because she will need additional help.

Service Highlights

SCHOOL SUPPLIES

One of PWNA's many services include our School Supplies service. This service provides supplies to eligible schools and Head Starts that serve Pre-K through 12th grade students. To be eligible, schools must be on or located near reservations served by PWNA. The goal is to help students to be prepared for homework and the classroom. Also to save the school/teachers/families funds that can be utilized elsewhere. School supplies must be distributed to students and NOT kept as classroom supplies.

The four components of the School Supplies service are Head Start, Elementary, Middle, and High School. Supplies are grade appropriate, and examples of supplies are as follows:

Head Start/Pre K: Crayons, glue, & paper.

Elementary: Wide ruled paper, pencils, & rulers.

Mid/High School: 3-ring binders, pens, & calculators.

Partners can find the School Supplies request on our Program Partner website or email/call our office to request a copy of the request. The deadline is May 1st and PWNA is currently accepting requests. Requests will be reviewed, and Partners will be notified if the request was approved or declined. Once approved, the School Supply report and sign-out sheets will be due 30 days from the distribution date.





Our warehouses strive to use all the different items generously donated to our inventory. To show that every item has value, we strive to demonstrate alternate uses for some of our less-requested items. Here are some examples of items that can be used creatively to meet needs in your communities.

Multi-Purpose Cleaner: Lavender scent can be used to clean floors and other surfaces that can be cleaned with water.

Disinfectant: Ready to use disinfectant cleaner, is mostly used in cleaning hospitals, schools and nursing homes but can also disinfect surfaces like walls, tables, bathroom tile, kitchen counters, stovetops and cabinets. DO NOT use disinfectant on eating utensils, plates or glassware.

Dishwashing Detergent Pots/Pans: Liquid dishwashing detergent for use on glasses, dishes, pots and pans.

PPE: We have multiple types of face masks – disposable, N-95 masks and disposable children's masks. Shoe covers can be used to keep mud off your shoes. Head covers can be used to cover bowls. Isolation gowns can be used as an art smock or to keep your clothes clean.






EDUCATION UPDATE
